

Advanced Drivers

Update from Herefordshire Advanced Drivers

•

Since the 17th May when we were able to recommence incar observed drives we have prioritised those whose mentoring towards becoming an advanced driver had been disrupted by the restrictions due to Covid-19. Good progress has been made and several will be taking the advanced test in the next few weeks. This will enable us to undertake driver refresher days for members of the public during the autumn, leading to more taking the advanced driver course and we have also offered a free observed refresher drive to all our members so that their driving is maintained at a high level.

Recent research by IAM has shown that many motorists during the last eighteen months have lost confidence in their driving with 33% feeling stressed by the prospect of driving on busier roads and 27% expressing concern about drivers being out of practice. These, together with other concerns emphasise the role that our refresher days, in-car observing and advanced course mentoring can play in restoring confidence and developing safe driving for the benefit of all road users. A further finding from the research was that many people were concerned that their vehicles, often little used during the last year or more, might breakdown particularly on lengthy journeys. The validity of this was demonstrated on the weekend after schools had closed in July for the summer holidays when breakdown services reported huge volumes of traffic and record numbers of breakdowns. This highlighted the need to ensure that servicing is up to date and that vehicles are checked before use, particularly before long journeys.

Recently, the Department for Transport announced a summer cycling and walking campaign. Linked to this will be new rules based on the requirement that road users who have the potential to cause the greatest harm should take the greatest share of the responsibility for road safety. These will include new rules for cycling and giving way to pedestrians at side road junctions. The proposals will be debated by parliament during the autumn and, if approved, will then become law with an updated Highway Code.

There will be considerable changes in road conditions together with reduced hours of daylight in the next few weeks as we move from summer into autumn, so do take account of the changes and we wish you all continued safe driving.



Value of Churchyards

Churchyards are a vital place in our communities, both rural and urban. They provide much that is needed, a sense of history, a green place, somewhere to go and remember, somewhere to contemplate our lives!

If it sounds like I am being dramatic, well, perhaps I am slightly. But if you live in a place of concrete and street lights, of cars and fast-food outlets, there isn't much that is green around you and a churchyard in the middle of an urban environment provides not only a green space but also somewhere for nature to thrive.

In a rural context, they are also very valuable. They are places where the names powerful families from the past live on, they give an insight into life of the times – you only need to see how many children died to be reminded that we live in something of a golden age. They are places to sit and contemplate. They are also places where we can encourage nature – they all don't have be to mown to within an inch of their life – we can have bird boxes (at Little Birch and Much Birch) and wilder, less cut areas (again at Little Birch) that



encourage a range of wild flowers. Yes, they may not look as "nice" as we would like, but they do provide homes for flowers, voles, mice etc.

> So support your local churchyard, volunteer to help keep parts of it tidy, give a donation if you can, encourage your Parish Council to support the costs of keeping them, they are vital areas for this generation and those to come.

Mason's of Merrivale

Firstly, for those who don't do Facebook, a big thank you to those who supported the walk and cream tea. We made lots of money towards the Macmillan mighty hike that I'm doing in September. Very grateful to Angela and everyone who made it such an enjoyable afternoon. I can't wait for the Dawn Chorus walk now that we will be holding next April – all being well.

Now back to the farm. We have just completed our third cut of silage so, along with the pit full of whole crop silage done in mid July our fodder stocks are looking so much better than last year.

Our crop of fodder beet is also looking very promising, apart from the abundance of weeds. Next year we think we need to drill it later and hoe it twice which will hopefully control them better.

It hasn't been a particularly wet summer for us but there has certainly been enough rain to keep the grass growing well. All the paddocks are being topped as the cows come off them to freshen up the grass for autumn growing.

Our next big task is to fill the barns with straw for bedding during the winter. So far nothing has been combined and although a latish season, the weather is not good for the arable farmers. Hopefully the forecast warm, dry spell arrives at the end of the month to help everyone. A dryish autumn would now help so that we can keep all the cattle our for as long as possible.

A first for us in the last week is to have a calf with a broken leg (photo attached) We assume her mother trod on her. Not having happened before we were unsure of the outcome but very pleased to say having been plastered by the vet, all looks good. Being so young means she should mend well and is getting plenty of attention from the family.

Bob and I are busy with the vegetable growing, I'm not sure why everyone moans about a lack of insects as our patch seems to have masses of them – good and bad! Cabbage whites are a big problem this year, the weather obviously suits them perfectly.

The milk vending machine is progressing nicely, all the equipment and vending machines are now here. We're still installing the electrics and are waiting on doors and a roof, so nearly there. You can now follow our progress on Facebook and Instagram@merrimilk.

In the next instalment I should have plenty to write about with the new Milk Hut in operation. Enjoy the rest of the summer/autumn, it's wonderful to be out and about again.
