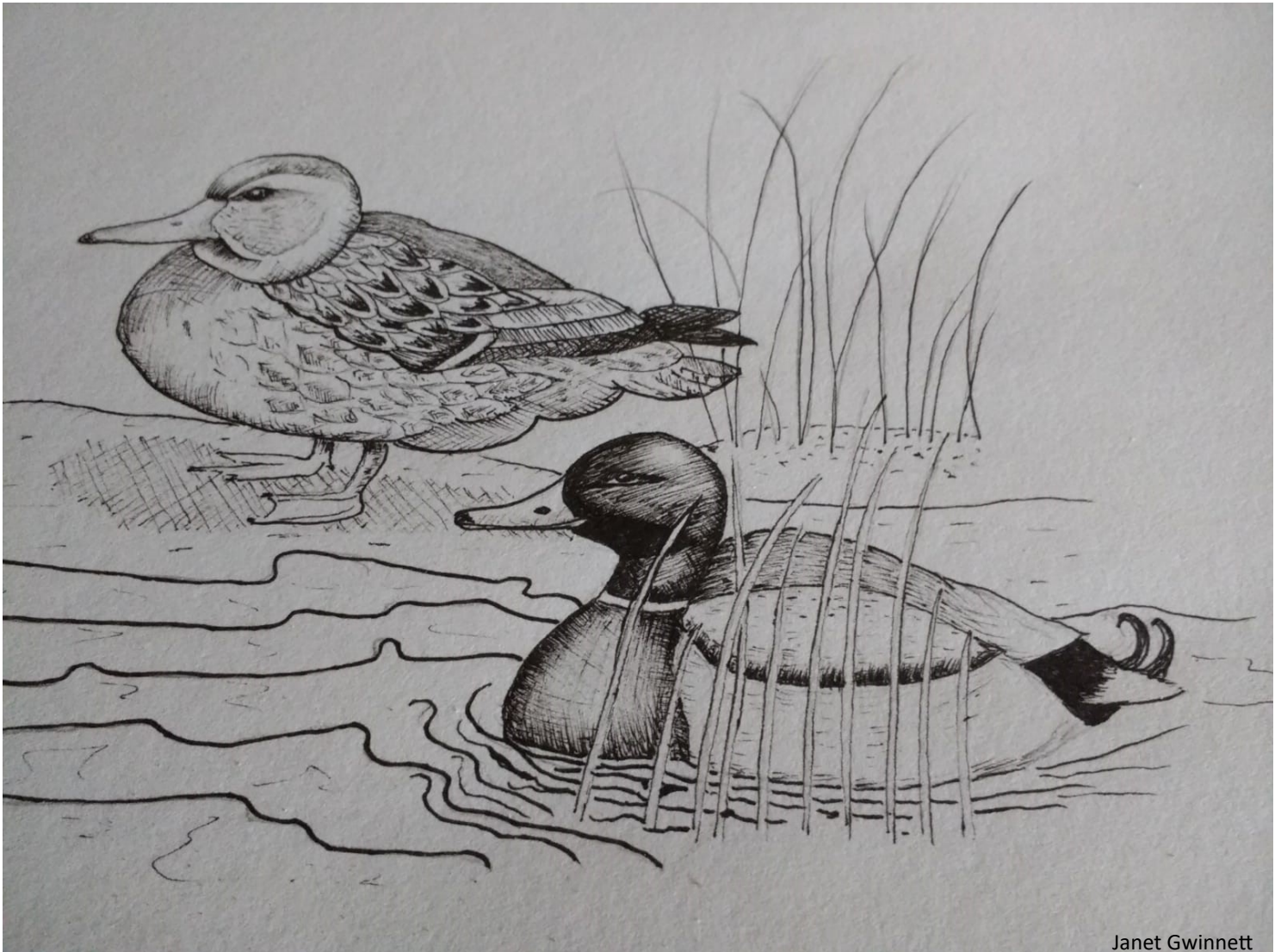

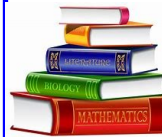

## Jobs in the garden for January



Poinsettia – Shop outlets have a habit of displaying these near a door to catch your eye. It is likely that the draft and incoming cold air will cause the foliage to drop off within a short while. Buy those that are displayed in a warmer location in future. For a bit of fun try keeping a plant with a view to it flowering the following year. When the leaves fall, cut the stems back to about 2 to 3 inches. Keep the compost almost dry. In early May, water well and then repot removing some of the old compost. Feed regularly. The plant should start to produce new growth. Keep the strongest 4 or 5 new shoots and remove any others (those cut off can be used as cuttings. Stand in water for a few hours to stop the latex bleeding from the cut). The important bit – Each evening from the end of September for 8 weeks you must exclude light from the plant for at least 14 hours daily. Cover with a box or place in a cupboard and ensure complete darkness for the whole 14 hours duration. After the 8 weeks treat the plant normally. I have succeeded a couple of times.

What else can we do?

Prune young deciduous trees while leafless to improve the structure and with mature trees, thin the branches, and if desired, raise the canopy.

Destroy spotted/blotched leaves of Pansy/Viola as this is probably a fungal disease.

Cut back the foliage on Hellebores so flowers aren't obscured by old leaves. This will also help to control Hellebore leaf spot disease.

Pinch out tips of Autumn sown sweet peas. Provide protection if adverse weather occurs.

Sow summer brassicas – cauliflower calabrese and cabbage – in a propagator or on a warm window sill. Grow on in a frame or greenhouse.

Buy seed potatoes and onion sets.

If you intend to show large onions (over 9 oz) sow seeds at the beginning of the month in a seed tray or cell tray. Place on a warm window sill if you do not have a heated propagator. When germinated and the seedlings have reached the 'crook' stage prick out and plant into individual pots, providing as much light as you can.

Begin forcing rhubarb by placing a large inverted receptacle over the crowns.

Do the monthly check of stored apples, pears, potatoes and onions, removing any rotten fruits.

Keep bird feeders stocked with fresh food, birdbaths clean and with fresh water, and clean out and re-hang nesting boxes.

Recycling in the garden – plastic yoghurt and cream pots, margarine tubs and fruit punnets all make good growing containers. Cardboard tubes – from toilet rolls and kitchen towels – can be placed on their ends in boxes or large plastic catering size mushroom trays and filled with compost. These are ideal for sowing beans and sweet peas. **Derek Scrivens**

## THE MASONS AT MERRIVALE

I wrote my last article back in July and so much has happened this year. We took our first cut of silage in late May instead of much earlier in the month because of the very cold April and then wet May. We thought this delay would mean we would only manage 3 cuts this year, not the usual 4, but of course nature sorting itself out, we took our final cut in the good weather in mid October. In contrast to 2020, we have a good supply of silage to feed through this winter.

On top of that, we have the fodder beet, a new crop for us this season. We have had a great yield from it but are learning as we go and, weather permitting, will plant it later next year to allow us more time to cultivate the ground for weed control. This year the beet grew fantastically, as did the fat hen with it! Being organic, our only method of weed control is by cultivation & hoeing so the more we can do before we plant to produce a clean seed bed the better.

The cows absolutely love eating the beet. It is obviously very tasty for them and is a very valuable high energy feed, being very beneficial to fresh calved cows who relish the energy boost. Their winter diet consists of grass silage, whole crop silage, fodder beet and a concentrate blend. This is fed at barriers outside the milking robots and then they eat extra cow cake while milking in the robots.

We have been fortunate in being able to rent an additional 60 acres of land locally and will use this to grow more cereals in a bid to make ourselves more self sufficient in concentrate feed. The ground will go into organic conversion in the spring and will then take 2 years to gain full organic status. It has been planted with winter wheat which will have to be sold as we cannot use this in the first year of conversion. In the second year (C2), we will be allowed to feed a certain percentage before it is fully organic from the third year onwards. We have sheep everywhere on the farm at the moment cleaning up the pastures to ensure fresh grass growth in the spring. These sheep are all organic, one flock from Holme Lacy College and another from the Welsh hills.

Of course our big event of the year was the opening of the milk hut on 1<sup>st</sup> October. We had hoped to open in April but there were so many hold ups with the grant application, sourcing materials, availability of contractors, machine deliveries and everything else COVID had to throw at us.

The first week of opening was manic, those who visited us will remember the machine payments weren't working properly and had to be manned for a few days, a far cry from the self service option we thought we'd signed up for!

Teething problems now sorted, we've been delighted and very grateful for all of the local support. It's a real morale boost to meet customers old and new and have a chat when they visit. I really do enjoy meeting folks when I'm at the hut. I try to go when it's not too busy as I'm not generally dressed in my best, maybe I'll have smarter gear for Christmas!

We have been surprised by the popularity of the vegetables and due to this realise we will have to up our acreage next year to keep up with supply. Bob has spent hours planning next season's planting quantities and schedule to maintain a constant range of fresh veg next year.

Emily has also had to increase the number of cakes she's baking to keep up with demand but has now settled into a routine, as the rest of us have, to manage supply. We're not quite sure what will happen over Christmas and just how busy we will be but I can let you know all about that next time.

The winter routine on the farm is in full swing now, with all animals housed meaning they're kept in the warm and fed and bedded daily. The fantastic dry weather has meant we have been able to cart muck out to the fields ready for spreading in the spring. I think like everyone, we look forward to passing the shortest day so we can think ahead to spring and the cycle beginning again, who knows what next year will bring.

In good news, Zorro Patty the little calf that broke her leg has mended nicely. After much TLC from everyone, her cast came off after 6 weeks & although a little crooked it's mended nicely. She's now weaned and growing nicely ready to be turned out with her pals in Spring.

We thank everyone for the support they have given us over the past year and wish you all the very best for 2022.

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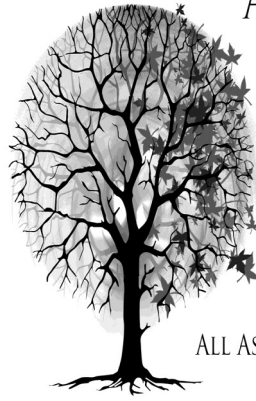
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## Update from Herefordshire Advanced Drivers

During the autumn we were able to continue with the mentoring of those who had started the Advanced Driving Course before the lockdowns. Many have now passed whilst most of the remainder have reached test standard and are awaiting their test drives. This is now enabling us to arrange Driver Refresher Days which will begin early in the New Year. Apart from those arranged for specific organisations, we are organising a programme of such days for the general public across the county and throughout the year. Feedback from previous participants shows that almost all of them are of the opinion that having attended they are driving more safely and with greater confidence in difficult driving conditions.

The sessions include an observed drive in participants' own cars with a trained and experienced observer whose role is to gently and encouragingly ensure that the various principles of safe driving discussed during the day are being put into practice. Thereafter, many participants decide to take the Advanced Driving Course but the really important factor is that they are driving more safely. ### Driving in Winter

Driving conditions in winter can be particularly hazardous and it is vital to be prepared for the worst. Before setting out on any journey check the weather forecast. Ensure tyres are at the correct pressures and that all lights are operating correctly. Are windscreen wipers in good condition and is the battery fully charged? Also, check all liquids (oil, coolant, brakes, power steering and windscreen fluid – it is worthwhile adding screen wash to prevent freezing of the windscreen fluid). Clean all windows, light covers and mirrors. Take a torch with you together with a blanket, emergency food and a hot drink if very cold weather is forecast – you could be delayed by blocked roads or accidents.

Switch on lights as soon as visibility deteriorates. Aim to avoid any sharp braking by good anticipation. Maximise visibility of the road ahead by good positioning, check in mirrors before signalling and do so in good time. Limit speed so that you can always stop within the distance of the road ahead that is clear and maintain at least that distance from the vehicle ahead. Beware of being blinded by low sun and watch for ice particularly where sunshine does not reach the road surface due to overhanging trees or shade from buildings.

Finally, do not be intimidated, frustrated or angered by poor or aggressive driving by others. Your priority is to arrive safely and to do all you can to ensure the safety of other road users. A very happy New Year to you all and drive safely.

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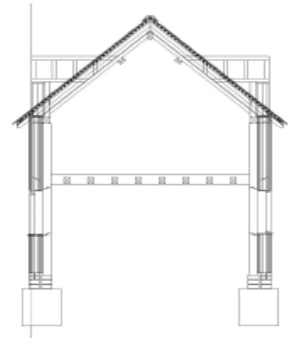
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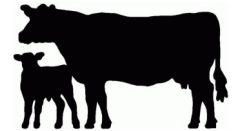
# MERRIVALE ORGANIC BEEF

One advantage during lockdown was that so many people were able to explore new areas on their own doorstep. We would like the festival to encourage more people to continue to find new 'hidden gem' walks and join like-minded people during this annual event."
