Jobs for the garden in May

Writing this in mid April, the daffodils are fading and tulips are taking pride of place while trees and hedges have their new fresh green leaves in abundance. A few asparagus tips have just emerged in the veg. garden and looking around, the early rhubarb is doing well while there are good quantities of carrots and Brussels sprouts, a few leeks, cauliflower and red cabbage, plus a few onions in store.

Hopefully this will keep the 'hungry season' to a minimum. We have three nest boxes and all three are being used – blue tits in one, great tits in another and the Robin who 'adopted' us 5 years ago has moved his mate in to the robin box and there are 4 eggs ready for incubation. Further activity suggests a blackbird's nest in the clematis on our shed. We are waiting to hear the cuckoo and for the return of the house martins.

Here are a few ideas for May

- *Keep weeding.
- *Cuttings for deciduous shrubs fuchsias, hydrangeas, lavatera can be taken this month.
- *Spring clean' house plants by wiping dust off smooth leaves with a damp cloth and use a soft brush for hairy leaves.
- *Tender plants and young plants raised under cover can be gradually hardened off.
- *Aphids can be controlled with organic insecticide if infestation is severe. Otherwise leave them to ladybirds, lacewings, ants, wasps and birds.
- *Divide large clumps of daffodils and snow-drops.
- *Plant up hanging baskets and containers. If you have a greenhouse, and have room in it, keep them in for a few days to help them establish. In any case keep them sheltered.

- *Listen to weather forecast for frosts.
- The state of the s
- *Sow runner beans, dwarf beans, cucumbers courgettes and squashes (not forgetting that heaviest marrow for the horticultural show).
- *Those of you with a greenhouse should do all you can to keep the temperature down as it can rise from a comfortable warmth to well over 100 degrees in a matter of minutes when the sun emerges from any clouds or shade. Open all vents and damp down and particularly if the greenhouse is small it will benefit from shading material or paint.
- *Keep bird baths clean and always topped up with fresh water.
- *Bird food should not include whole nuts or other bulky items.
- *Check ponds for tadpoles. Provide a shelf/ ramp for them and of course other wildlife to escape.
- *Plant scented flowers such as nicotiana, evening primroses and buddleja to attract moths, butterflies and bees. In fact any mauve/purple flowers will attract a wide range of insects.
- *When buying plants, single flowers are better than double flowers, as food is generally more accessible for insects from singles.



Jacqueline Ann Morley

1939-2022

Jackie was a Cockney, having been born in University College Hospital within sound of Bow bells. Her father was an RAF officer working in military intelligence during WW2. For the first few years of her life she lived with her parents, firstly near to RAF Hornchurch then in north London. During the war she was evacuated with her mother to Morecambe to avoid the danger from German bombing.

After primary school she was awarded a scholarship to attend the prestigious Dame Alice Owen's school in Islington London. It was founded in 1613 by the Worshipful Company of Brewers who still provided some financial support including annual money gifts to all pupils referred to as "beer money". From the age of 11 Jackie travelled alone by underground train from her home to the school. She recalled visiting the home of one of her classmates, the daughter of "Hutch", Granada born Leslie Hutchinson, who was then one of the leading cabaret singers in the world. During her school years she enjoyed family holidays, including two sisters, staying at the Red Lion hotel in Clovelly Devon.

At the age of 16 she did not have the opportunity to continue with education, something she always regretted. Instead she worked for Biro-Swan the pen company. Having money of her own enabled her to join the North London branch of the Youth Hostels Association and travel around the country with like minded young people. She stayed in touch with several of the friends she met at this time for the rest of her life. One of the members of this group was Peter Lawrence who founded PGL holidays specialising, at first, in canoeing trips down the river Wye. Around this time she also became interested in folk dancing and joined a group based at Cecil Sharp House near Regents Park.

Later, Jackie took a job as laboratory technician at Battersea College of Technology where she met Mike and they married in 1959 at Brentwood, Essex and honeymooned in Clovelly. They moved to Hereford where a daughter, Amanda, was born and then to Capricorn, Kingsthorne in 1963. Three more children were born there during the next five years, Hilary, Simon and Geraldine.

As well as looking after the four children Jackie became very interested in gardening and also worked in the local strawberry fields during the summer. When the children grew older and were able to look after themselves she took a job at Marks and Spencer where she worked for 15 years to help finance further education. After that she gave up work and moved to Uplands, Little Birch to enable her to concentrate on her increasing passion for gardening.

During the next few years she did an outstanding job in cultivating the Uplands garden and opened it to visitors to raise money for Little Birch village hall. She then became an enthusiastic member of the hall committee, ran the bar at many well attended events and was a keen supporter of the Drama Group. At her suggestion one year the group performed a version of 'Allo 'Allo for its summer show. Not surprisingly she was delighted that it was an outstanding success and many will remember it for a long time to come. She was especially touched when her friends and family organised a surprise party in the village hall for her 70th birthday.

She regarded living in Little Birch as the best time of her life and did not have much enthusiasm for travel and holidays. Nevertheless she was persuaded at various times to visit Australia, New Zealand, United States and European countries occasionally accompanying Mike on business trips.

To help with her decreasing mobility it was decided to move to a specially built home, Fairhurst (her maiden name) next to Uplands in 2020. This made her life a lot easier but unfortunately that was not to last long. She suffered a stroke in 2021 and that, combined with other health problems, resulted in her death in Hereford hospital in March.

Jackie was a person with very strong views and she did not hesitate to make them known. In particular she said that she did not want a funeral and that any money saved should be spent on a party. Consequently, after an unattended direct cremation was completed a celebration party has been arranged.

All her friends, neighbours and family are cordially invited to come to the celebration party on 11th May, 7-10.30pm (or later if appropriate) in Little Birch village hall. There will be a buffet meal, real ale, wine and live musical entertainment designed to be joyful to celebrate her life.




