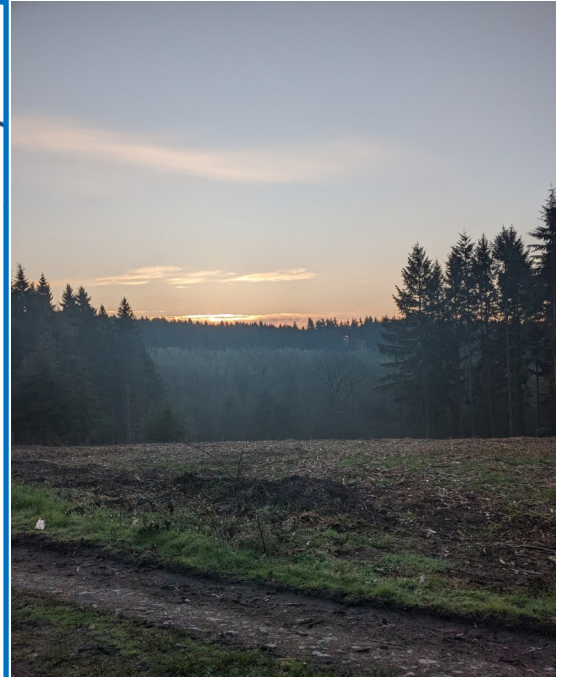

Thinking about our Society

There are some “interesting” times coming – as you may well remember from the Chinese saying “May you live in interesting times!” A number of factors are combining that are going to affect us here in our bit of Herefordshire.

Firstly, is food – or rather food price inflation. We all know how much things have increased in price in recent times and that does not look like ending any time soon. Fuel and fertilizer prices are still high, grain and sunflower oil from Ukraine are affected by the continuing conflict.

Secondly, is the environment – we had a record-breaking summer last year, we had a very dry February this year so far and a wet March, we have groups highlighting the state of the Wye and farming run-off.

Thirdly, is AI – I know it doesn’t feel like it is affecting us at the moment but just a few weeks ago we all wondered at seeing Pope Francis wearing a white puffer jacket – only to discover that it was an AI generated photo. AI is in your smart-phone – whenever you take a picture, it does a lot of heavy lifting with regard to removing camera shake and sharpening up objects, adjusting colours and contrasts and a myriad other things. It is starting to write exam question answers via ChatGPT and may be even the Vicar’s sermon! If we thought COVID brought about some big changes in society – you haven’t seen anything yet.

And now is the chance to influence how these factors are going to shape our world. If we don’t care for our environment then there won’t be much of a world for us and the following generations to enjoy. If we don’t think about the way that the algorithms of AI are working, then biases in the system will become so blatant that whole groups become excluded. If we don’t think long term about how our farming system works, then we become more vulnerable to being held hostage by some outside actor.

All of this could be seen as a reason for despair, yet we have something bigger than these challenges, something which undergirds our society and that we are in danger of losing – the idea of God’s kingdom.

In the Bible a different way of living is laid out, one of community and care, one of valuing love and not material wealth, one that is supportive of human flourishing (‘Life and life in all its fulness’ from John) rather than being anonymous cogs and consumers in some great economic machine that cares nothing for our wellbeing only that we earn and spend, that we buy and sell.

God values everyone and everything – nothing is insignificant for God who made it all. Let us make sure that we keep the values that support our thriving communities no matter what “interesting” things come our way.

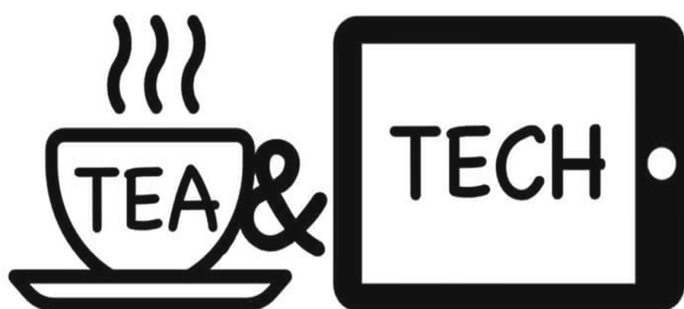

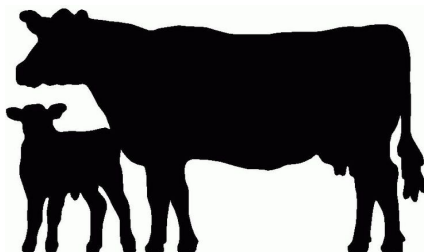

Jobs for the garden in May

After the 'drought' in February hardly a day has gone by without some rain and at the time of writing we have post Easter gales. I was able to cut our grass, with the blades quite high, in late March but it desperately needs another cut, or the loan of a couple of sheep. Potatoes, onions, broad beans, cabbage, calabrese and kohlrabi have been planted out, whilst a range of vegetable seeds have been sown in modules in the greenhouse.

By the time you are reading this, we will know whether our local Cuckoo has completed the journey from central Africa, including the precarious crossing of the Sahara Desert. The BTO have tagged a number of Cuckoos and on 11th April five of those tagged had reached France and Spain but unfortunately a larger number are no longer 'active'. It would be great to see more House Martins and Swallows this year. I am writing this in mid April and so far have seen little sign of birds nesting and no frog spawn.

Gardening Club News

Our AGM in March was attended by more members than last year which is an encouraging sign as we try to encourage locals to join us and increase our membership.

As I write this we are looking forward to a talk on the 26th April by Ian Sadler who is going to talk on 'Innovation, Automation, how your garden and house plants are produced in the 21st century'. This will be an amazing insight of how commercial nurseries work today.

Our May meeting (31st) will be a talk by Philip Aubury 'The history of Birmingham Botanical Gardens. This will take the form of a virtual tour from a retired director. There will be cards and plants for sale (cash only).

In June and July we have trips out to local gardens. On June 28th we will visit Kentchurch court, one of the best 12 secret gardens in the U.K. Then in July we will visit Weston Hall. More information to follow on each of these.

The first Saturday in September, as always, we hold our Annual Horticultural Show. Schedules available in June from all the usual places. This is a long running special event in the village to be enjoyed by all. We encourage everyone to take part in any way they can. All entries welcomed.

We will be having a table of gardening items for sale at every meeting. Bring along your surplus plants, seeds, magazines etc. We usually meet on the last on the last Wednesday of the month. Little Birch Village Hall, 7.30pm. Refreshments provided. Come along and you will be made very welcome. Annual membership is £15.00 each or £25.00 per couple. Visitors also welcomed. Here are a few ideas for May

- *Keep weeding.
- *Slug watch!!
- *Spring clean' house plants, wiping dust off smooth leaves with a damp cloth. Soft brush for hairy leaves.
- *Tender plants and young plants raised under cover can be gradually hardened off.
- *Divide large clumps of daffodils and snowdrops.
- *Plant up hanging baskets and containers. If you have a greenhouse, and have room in it, keep them in for a few days to help them establish or keep sheltered.
- *Improve lawns – apply fertilizer and overseed any patchy areas keeping watered in dry spells.
- *Sow hardy annuals.
- *Thin seedlings when they have their first true leaves.
- *Sow runner beans, dwarf beans, cucumbers, courgettes and squashes (not forgetting that heaviest marrow for the horticultural show).
- *Earth up potatoes.
- *Sow quick maturing veg. baby carrots, radish, salad leaves and spinach. None of these need large areas of ground; you could even try them in amongst flowers in borders – beetroot look attractive too.
- *Keep bird baths clean & topped up with fresh water. Bird food should not include whole nuts or bulky items.
- *Check ponds for tadpoles. Provide a shelf/ramp for them and, of course, other wildlife to escape.
- *Plant scented flowers such as nicotiana, evening primrose & buddleia to attract moths, butterflies and bees. Any mauve/purple flowers will attract insects. When buying plants, single flowers are better than double flowers, as food is generally more accessible for insects from singles.

Passage Farm

Well, here we are at Passage Farm on the banks of the Severn, across the water from Newnham, It's a fabulous sunny day. This is our first time out since last October, and what a wet, cold miserable winter it was. We have seriously thought about selling our lovely second home several times, but now the sun is shining and we are here. So, no, I don't think there will be a sale for quite a while. How did we come to be here today, it was a toss-up between here or Martley, the result is obvious.

Once again, we had a lovely drive down, all thirty nine miles. We could see that there has been lots of rain from Gloucester down, loads of standing water in the fields, arrived at the site to be told to go to pitch three or four, ouch, that's on grass, I thought that we would be on the long gravel drive, however, we comply.

Drive up the track (hardcore) and come down the edge of the field, I comply, it's flat, but it feels very sticky, then it is sticky, and then I'm stuck, right opposite our pitch. Now what? The sun was bright and the sky was really blue with no clouds. It took quite a while to warm up. We agreed yesterday that if the sun was shining today, we would have a lazy day on our site
