

# Jobs for the garden in October

We frequently hear of new invasive beetles, moths and wasps, entering the British Isles, that have the ability to devastate our native trees and other wildlife. It recently came to my attention that an article in The Guardian reported that in 2023 many sightings of Asian Hornets have occurred. Since 2016 there have been 45 sightings with 22 in 2023 alone. Almost all sightings have been in Kent and there is concern that they may have established themselves in that area. Further sightings have occurred along the south coast in Hampshire, Dorset and Devon. The government's strategy is to locate and kill every hornet and destroy all nests to prevent them from staying over winter and multiplying. They predate on many insects especially honey bees and our solitary bee species, obviously posing a threat to pollination and honey production. There are a few beekeepers in the area that this newsletter extends to and I suspect that they are already aware of the threat. We should all be vigilant. ### Jobs to do

- \*Alpine troughs will benefit from being placed under cover or against a wall in rain shadow away from the prevailing wind.
- \*Check greenhouse heaters are in good working order.
- \*Lift and divide large clumps of perennials.
- \*Lift and store dahlia tubers.
- \*Mist house plants.
- \*Rake up fallen leaves off lawn or pick up with the mower. If you have large quantities collect up and pack into empty compost bags, seal and pierce holes in bag. Set aside for 12 to 18 months and you should have some superb leaf mold.
- \*Remove larger figs which are unlikely to ripen, leaving only pea sized fruit. Protect these from frost to ripen next year.
- \*Harvest main crop potatoes (if not already done), pumpkins and marrows.
- \*Keep harvesting apples, pears and grapes.
- \*In sheltered plots sow broad beans at the end of the month. They must be hardy e.g. The Sutton or Aquadulce.
- \*Divide rhubarb.
- \*Plant garlic.
- \*Plant out Spring cabbage.



\*Continue to feed birds and provide fresh water.

\*Chop up windfall apples and pears and place on bird tables

- \*Remove fruit nets. If you have a fruit cage, remove the 'roof' net just in case we have snow.
- \*Remove excess fallen leaves from ponds to prevent the buildup of too much decaying organic material in the water.
- \*Clean out and re-hang nesting boxes.



# **Community Speed Watch Update**

It's only taken nearly a year but at last we can move forward with the Community Speed Watch scheme which is great news as speeding is one of the main concerns within the Parish. Our proposed sites have been checked and risk assessed and it seems they have been approved, including on the A49 which is very promising.

I have the details of those who volunteered last September and will be contacting them to see if they're still interested and available but does anyone else fancy getting involved? In summary, the scheme allows volunteers to monitor the speed of passing vehicles using a hand-held speed detection device and they record the details of vehicles which are exceeding the speed limit by around 10%. There have to be three volunteers doing the monitoring and it can only be done where the speed limit is below the national average.

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# Why don't we recycle more?

Everyone recognises that we cannot go on exploiting the earth and plundering its resources. We need to move from our current economic model of extracting every last penny from nature and putting nothing back to a more circular economy where things are repurposed, reused and recycled.

This got me thinking about recycling – and how poor we are at it! The latest data shows that we recycled only 44.6% of our household waste in 2021 (the last year figures are available). This is slightly up from 2020. But that percentage doesn't reflect the fact that we generate something like 230 million tonnes of the stuff! That is a lot that is going to landfill!

Part of the problem is cultural – we just throw things away when we don't need them anymore. We may be good and wash out our cans and put them in the green bin, but the complex stuff we just chuck in the general waste and make it someone else's problem.

We are not helped by manufacturing, which seems to use stuff that we cannot recycle. For example, the only part of the Pringle tube you can recycle is the top because the cardboard, coated with a metalized film, goes straight into landfill. If we are to recycle more, it needs to be made easier and more convenient and we need to be more assiduous in what we do. Reuse, repair and recycle. Let's do our part for God's creation. **Revd Mark**



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
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### **Much Birch Parish Council**

At Much Birch Parish Council Meeting held in Much Birch Community Hall on 7<sup>th</sup> September the Parish Council discussed and agreed to comments in regard to two local planning applications: Planning Consultation 232379 - Wenallt, Kingsthorne, Herefordshire, HR2 8AL this being for proposed change of levels at the rear garden formed by gabions (part retrospective) and Consultation 232316 – Land at Hollybush Lane, Much Birch being for reserved matters on a previous application. The parish council resolved to comment that there were no objections from the parish council, in respect of both the applications. The parish council also heard concerns about the sale of three local land parcels near Hollybush Lane. The council had made enquiries and established that the sales related to land for agricultural or equestrian purpose. There did not appear to be any evidence of plans to alter usage. The dates for the forthcoming meetings are 5<sup>th</sup>October, 9th Nov and 7th Dec from 7.30pm at Much Birch Community Hall. All are welcome.

### **Tips from RoSPA for Safer Fireworks**

Keep fireworks in a closed box and use them one at a time. Read and follow the instructions on each firework using a torch if necessary.

Light firework at arm's length with a taper. Stand well back.

Keep naked flames, including cigarettes, away from fireworks.

Never return to a firework once it has been lit.

Don't put fireworks in pockets and never throw them.

Direct any rocket fireworks well away from spectators.

Never use paraffin or petrol on a bonfire.

### **Much Birch Old Charities**

Over the years a number of donations were given under the care of the then PCC for the relief of the poor in the parish of Much Birch. This included an area of land off Hollybush Lane, which has been sold. This means that for the first time in some time, the Trustees have money that can be distributed to people who live in the ecclesial parish of Much Birch and are eligible. The eligibility criteria are quite broad. Any person who finds themselves in financial distress or similar may apply. For example, if you are on a limited income and need a replacement cooker or are a student at college or university, you may be eligible for a grant to help you meet your expenses.

Please let Revd Mark know if you would like to fill in an application form. The Trustees will meet at the end of October to decide the range and size of grants to be given.



### Eric and Doe's Irish Tour continued

We are now at a little hamlet called Dunserverick, just about four miles from the Giants Causeway. It's 'rain and wind stop play.' What a rough day, but we shall move further east tomorrow. We are actually headed to the further Atlantic shores and Donegal (bandit country). We have been housebound for most of the day, except for us briefly donning all and walking down to the little harbour. Such a pretty place, but wild today. It's been scrabble, cribbage, computer games—so nice to have all those mod cons like electricity.

Wild camping is best in summer. We have had a really good trip, great coast to drive along, some amazing houses and very few crap ones. Lots of long low houses similar to the Welsh long houses. Missing the Wi-Fi, surprisingly we have not been bored, but you could confirm that. Just ask the boss!

**Tuesday 5th** It's one week since we left home and 370 miles to our CL@Castlerock near Coleraine. Just 108 miles over here to this site. The other sites have been on the shore, this one is about 1300ft up overlooking the sea. Wind is still howling and periods of heavy rain. Fantastic view down to the sea when we can see it! No sign of the SUN.

First stop was the Giants Causeway about three miles away. It's NT so no fees to pay. It was about a half mile down to see the causeway, first impressions, is that it?! First impressions don't always mean a lot, actually. We walked beyond, looked back, and it really was quite spectacular. A path went up the coastal high edge. Not many people about, but even so there were a few almost at the far point about half a mile away. We had to go and see, why, because we're a nosy pair and can't let them see something that we haven't! It was quite a plod to the top, there was almost a gap at the end of the walk where the wind just screamed through—50 mph perhaps. There was just another little bay the other side but we were there.

The stones were really very strange, (you must see the photos to get the right perspective). It was well worth the trip.

Back in the van, we head down to Dunluce Castle a wee way (as they say), a spectacular place considering that it started to fall apart in 1620. The McDonalds up and left for their other castle at Glen Arm, after which I think any and everybody just came and looted stones, slates and any timber that they could carry to build there own little palaces.

We need to replenish our stocks, but where to find a decent store is difficult. Doe seems to think somebody mentioned a Lidle Store, but we are not sure where. Driving through Portrush we spot a Spar. We stop and do some shopping. Put sat nav for Castle Rock, then minutes later we drive into a big Lidl, more shopping!

Wednesday 6th April Arrived at Castlerock, the road is closed. Luckily the engineer was still there, couldn't believe there was a camp site up there he said, as if he was looking up at the stars. We did find it, and here we are. Windy ,wet, the view is like a will o the wisp. Caught the train to Derry or even Londonderry! This was supposed to be one of the countries most scenic journeys. Even Michael Portillo thought so. We followed him to Alaska but

I'm glad we didn't do this trip on his recommendation. There is nothing to recommend it. We had a lovely long chat to a lady on the train who gave us a little history lesson. Derry, is a city that is built on a huge bend of the river Foyle. The inner part of the bend is Londonderry and all beyond is Derry, all mainly Catholic, and Protestants are in the walled city. All very religious. We walked the mile long wall around the city with its many ancient cannons still in place. Over the wall were the areas of the worst of the troubles such as Bogside. Flags still fly there and houses are still painted with scenes of the violence. We are not normally drawn to cities, but this time there was a purpose.

We woke to a lovely sunny morning, first time we've seen the sun since last Saturday , and then I heard the forecast. Wow, rain and gale force winds. For once the forecast was not right, it was quite a nice day but cold and one heavy shower while in Derry. As we drove into Castlerock this morning we spotted a lovely looking campsite. So on our return we drove onto the site, found the office. It was £20 per night and 50p for the shower. But what amazing facilities, one of the best ever, and it was nice and warm in there, the only drawback was that it was only 6amps of power. The wind is howling across the site and it's raining again. I did once say that we don't mind what the weather does, but ,come on, this is a bit much now! Tomorrow, according to the forecast it is force 10.

Thursday 7th What a night! The wind kept howling, the rain hammered down all through the night, but with the help of sleeping bag laid on top we were really snug. Today's plan is to cross to the other side. By 9am all had changed with the weather. We can even see the sun but, as always, the wind is a constant. It's back down to Londonderry, across the border at Muff. The only reason that we knew we had crossed was that the road signs had changed and fuel was cheaper. We are still travelling the Wild Atlantic Way, now in County Donegal and on to Inishowen. It really is an amazing road, from Moville we went straight up and over a wild mountain top then down to the sea and a lovely little bay.

We visited the "Famine village" on Doagh isle, such a beautiful spot on the sea shore, run by a brother and sister. There was a large room with tourist type nick-knacks. We did not realise that we were in for a few hours guided walk which was amazing. There was a typical old low white washed house with thatch roof. They had, as a family, all lived in the house until 1986. Electricity arrived in 1983.

The spiel that this man gave us about the way of life and death and the really strange customs had us in stitches. He then let us loose to visit the huge area he had built, so much to do with the potato famine of 1880s when all Ireland suffered and thousands died. His display involved lots about the troubles and the way things were.

We found a camp site at Binnion Bay, but not on the shore, probably just as well because it's cold and windy, but hey, there is hardly a cloud in the sky. Cold tonight. **Eric Joseph**
