Hi Everyone,

As 2024 rolls around, we find ourselves in a time of tension and confusion. There may well be an election later this year, which the polls predict could lead to a change of government and a new Prime Minister, the conflict in Ukraine seems to have become more like WW1 than we ever expected and the Middle East, often a place of high tensions, continues to promote conflict and have repercussions over the whole world.

We are not the first people to worry about the future. If you go back into the Old Testament, you find plenty of examples where political and military forces were arranged against God's people. Sometimes these armies melted away – like Sennacherib in II Chronicles 32 – and sometimes they

triumphed, such as the fall of Jerusalem brought about by Nebuchadnezzar (II Chronicles 36).

Even though God's people were taken into exile, they retained the hope of a better future. The captives in Babylon asked of the Lord's prophet, Jeremiah, what should they do. And he said, rather than mourn for the past, they should plant gardens and marry off their children!

So, even when the darkest of night seems to be at hand, there is always that part of us that hopes for a better future, a peaceful one. It might not happen next week or next month or even next year but it will come. So for 2024, we must remain bearers of hope, carriers of light in a darkened world.

Mel's Musings

By the time you are reading this Christmas will be over and everyone will be heartily sick of turkey, well most anyway – I love it. If you make the usual curry do you use your own curry powder, or a shop bought one?

I have a recipe I have used for many years, given to me by a colleague who used to be a professional chef. I always put it in a dry pan with some oil and gently heat and stir for a couple of minutes to cook the spices and enable them to release their oils before adding any other ingredients.

I mainly use whole spices and grind them down, as they keep their flavour for much longer, but using preground spices is fine, just make sure they still smell delicious or you will get no flavour to your final spice mix. I put in 2 teaspoons of each of the Curry Spice Mix, and that will make enough mix for three or so meals. Keep in a sealed jar in the dark to preserve the wonderful flavour. This will give you a moderate heat, so change the amount of chilli to suit your personal taste.

The First Snowdrop

The snowdrop flower has enjoyed a rich history that includes several legends about how the flower came to be. 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

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

Jobs in the garden for January

Walking around the garden (or maybe squelching is more appropriate) I see jobs that should have been done a while ago, but the ground has been too wet to work on. The greenhouse was bubble-wrapped towards the end of November and tender plants 'tucked up' for the winter, just in time to protect them from the 3 or 4 nights of hard frosts which we had at the end of November and the beginning of December.

The grower from whom I have bought sweet pea seeds for almost 20 years is about to retire, thus his seeds will not be available after this year. In a leaflet accompanying my purchases this year I was informed that they have a lot of seeds in stock and that it is possible to store them in a freezer. I have since bought some extras, enough for a couple of years, and am going to give it a try. Just got to be careful not to eat them!!

Here are a few things to do

- *Prune young deciduous trees while leafless to improve the structure, and, with mature trees, thin the branches, and if desired, raise the canopy.
- *Destroy spotted/blotched leaves of Pansy/Viola as this is probably a fungal disease.
- *Cut back the foliage on Hellebores so flowers aren't obscured by old leaves. This will also help to control Hellebore leaf spot disease.
- *Pinch out tips of Autumn sown sweet peas.

Provide protection if adverse weather occurs.

- *Sow summer brassicas cauliflower calabrese and cabbage in a propagator or on a warm window sill. Grow on in a frame or greenhouse.
- *Buy seed potatoes and onion sets.
- *Begin forcing rhubarb by placing a large inverted receptacle over the crowns.
- *Do the monthly check of stored apples, pears, potatoes and onions, removing any rotten fruits.
- *Keep bird feeders stocked with fresh food, birdbaths clean and with fresh water, and clean out and re-hang nesting boxes.
- *If there is snow shake it off tree branches and shrubs.
- *Prune grapevine if not already done.
- *Top up mulches around tender perennial plants to at least 15cm. **Derek Scrivens**

Much Birch Parish Council

At Much Birch Parish Council Meeting held in Much Birch Community Hall on the 7th December 2023 the Parish Council discussed, and agreed to comments, in regard to four local planning applications: firstly Planning Consultation 232938 – Wenallt, Kingsthorne, Hereford HR2 8AL, this being for new access to main road from driveway, proposed first floor to bungalow and new rear raised decking area. The parish council commented that there were no objections to 232938, with additional comments.

Secondly, Planning Consultation 233376 – Land at Highbury, Parish Lane, Little Birch, Herefordshire, HR2 8AT - proposed 3 bed dwelling house. The parish council commented that there were no objections to application 233376 but also highlighted that the agent had erroneously referred to the Little Birch Neighbourhood Development Plan in their application comments as opposed to the Much Birch NDP.

The third application discussed was for Planning Consultation 233331 – Land at Hollybush Lane, Much Birch, Herefordshire. This was an application for approval of reserved matters following outline approval of 200884 (Proposed site for erection of a single dwelling) - to formalise the adjustments in the scale and layout of the proposed scheme. The parish council commented that there were no objections to application 233331.

The fourth application discussed was for Planning Consultation 233211 - Chamonix, Wrigglebrook, Kingsthorne, Hereford, Herefordshire HR2 8AW – This was for a proposed single storey side extension to provide guest room, en-suite and utility. The parish council commented that there were no objections to application 233211. The dates for the forthcoming meetings, in the year 2024, are: Jan 11th, Feb 8th, March 7th, April 4th, May 9th, June 6th, July 4th, No meeting in August, Sept 5th, Oct 3rd, Nov 7th and Dec 5th. The next Parish Council Meeting of the Much Birch Parish Council will be held on **Thursday 11th January 2024 from 7.30pm** at the Much Birch Community Hall. All are welcome to attend.

Making Kefir

You can buy ready made kefir in any supermarket these days but it is cheaper and easy to make at home. Like natural yoghurt, it is made with milk but Kefir has a sharper taste and it is made with kefir "grains" which resemble pieces of cauliflower! When you cover the grains with milk they ferment the milk, breaking down the lactose into lactic acid. Kefir is rich in probiotics that are good for gut health.

Kefir is now eaten throughout the world, but for centuries it was said to be a closely-guarded secret of the Northern Caucasus region where people were renowned for their longevity, with one of the highest proportions of centenarians. Apparently everyone in the region drank kefir!

Traditionally kefir was made by combining fresh milk and kefir grains inside goatskin bags. During the daytime, the bags were hung in the doorways to catch the warmth of the sun. The bags were prodded by each person who went through the doorway. Presumably this helped the fermentation!

As the kefir was consumed, more fresh milk was added to the goatskin bag, forming a continuous cycle of fermentation and feeding all the family.

I find it easier to use a jam jar! Put the grains into a clean jar and cover them generously with milk. We are lucky to have this most important ingredient readily available—delicious fresh milk - at Merrivale Farm. Merrivale milk makes excellent kefir! Thanks, cows.

Leave the jar somewhere warm but not hot and in 24 hours (maybe less, depending on the temperature) there will be kefir. Straining the grains through a sieve is recommended but I often just suck the milk from them as I drink the kefir and drop them into a glass of water to rinse them before starting the process again. Creamy kefir on porridge is great!

I believe you can buy kefir grains online, but I have always been given grains by friends and, as they continue to reproduce themselves, I often hand on spare grains to others. If you would like some kefir grains I am happy to give some to you to try making it.
