Firstly it is important to state: Patients will see no day-to-day changes at the surgery

Recent Changes to the Practice Partnership

As you may already know, there have been a number of changes to the practice partnership in the last 2 years. The surgery has gone from 5 GP partners to 1, Dr Downing retired in April 2022, Dr Johnson chose to leave the partnership and become a salaried member of staff in October 2022, Dr Howe left in March 2023 and Dr Horne is leaving in February 2024.

Drs Seftel, Johnson, Baxter, Haverty, Clegg and Vaughan will all continue to work at Much Birch Surgery as normal.

GP Recruitment

You will also be aware that GP recruitment nationally, particularly into partnerships, is increasingly difficult and despite our best efforts we have been unable to attract new partners. Therefore, the current workload previously shared across 5 partners has fallen to one partner - this is not sustainable.

GP Federation

With these management and clinical resource challenges, we have been working alongside our GP Federation (Taurus Healthcare) since August 2022, to help ensure the future resilience of Much Birch Surgery. The Federation was established by all the GP surgeries in Herefordshire in 2012 to provide such support within primary care when necessary.

They also deliver general practice services on behalf of surgeries too, for example, our evening and weekend hubs on Thursdays and Saturdays, including the Herefordshire Out-of-hours GP service, the overnight nursing services and Herefordshire Remote Health where they provide greater appointment capacity via a team of remote GPs. This alone has delivered over 60,000 additional appointments for all practices across the County. They have also provided some strategic management advice, workshops reviewing our clinical modelling, plus providing additional

New Legal Partnership

Having discussed a number of options, the remaining partners (Dr Seftel and Dr Horne) decided that Novation was the best model moving forward, this ensured the least amount of disruption and minimal change for staff and patients plus ensured the long-term sustainability of the practice.

What does Novation mean?

• The partners will transfer all responsibility for the clinical workforce, operational and financial responsibility for delivering all General Medical Services to Taurus Healthcare.

• The practice team will continue to work at the practice as salaried members of Taurus.

This alleviates all the management and financial burden from the current partners and will help ensure the Practice's long term future.

What changes will you see as a Patient ?

None : The practice will continue to function with the same GPs, nurses, dispensing staff and reception team, so day-to-day you will see no changes.

Who approved this change and how long will it take ?

The Integrated Care Board (ICB) for Herefordshire and Worcestershire. The application has been approved and is expected to begin operating from February 2024.

Building Period

A condition of the approval includes the purchase of the practice building (by Taurus), this will ensure the practice continues to operate from the current location.

Dispensing Service

As part of the transfer, regulatory rules require us to **temporarily** stop dispensing for 30 calendar days. **Non-Dispensing period will be from Tuesday 6th February to Monday 11th March**

Repeat Medication

We have made arrangements for this period, particularly if you are receiving repeat medication. If your renewal falls within this period you will be given 2 x 28 days supply. Auto Notification : Dispensary will be working hard to complete all prescription requests, we will notify you once your prescription is ready for collection by text message.

Much Birch Surgery continued

If you have not received a notification after 5 working days of your prescription request approval, please call dispensary to talk further on your matter.

Prescription Collection between Tuesday 6th February and Monday 11th March

During this period all other prescriptions will be available through local pharmacies, you can choose your nearest/preferred branch.

If you have any queries about this, please call dispensary between hours of **09.00-17.00 on 01981 540310 option 3.**

Please be assured that, other than the disruption to Dispensing Services for 30 days, patients will see no day-to-day changes at the surgery.

Staff are having to work above and beyond to ensure patients experience as little disruption as possible. Please do not over order medication, order earlier than usual or collect earlier than usual. Please continue to order your medication 5 working days before you need it.



Jobs in the garden for February

At the time of writing we have had a few days without rain and are now being threatened with a cold period through much of January – will it snow? who knows? By the time you read this we will have found out. I have sown a few vegetable seeds and they are currently in the propagator, carried out some pruning, and have had a clear up of debris from the storms and anything else that looked unsightly around the garden.

The Little Birch Pantomime, which I am involved with, took place on the last weekend in January, and this annual event provides some distraction from waiting to awaken the garden with plans and hopes for the season.

Here are a few jobs that can be done

*Good time to prune most roses.

*Hardy shrubs that flower on new wood in summer can be pruned now.

*Keep amaryllis going – after flowers fade cut stems (not leaves) back to base, keep warm and keep watering and feeding.

*Refresh winter pot displays. Clear any thatch from faded plants and plant up with primroses, polyanthus and flowering bulbs

*Sweet peas can be sown in pots, root trainers or the cardboard 'inners' of toilet rolls.

*Cut back old autumn raspberries to ground level. If summer fruiting raspberries have grown taller than their support, cut stems back to about 10cm (4") above top wire.



*Add a general fertilizer (Growmore or Blood, Fish & Bone) to all tree, bush and cane fruit, fork in <u>lightly</u> (roots are just below the surface) and mulch with farm yard manure or compost.

*Sow Broad Beans in pots or root trainers and leave to germinate in the greenhouse, cold frame or a sheltered spot outside.

*Sow chilies and peppers in a heated propagator or on a sunny window sill.

*If you grow vegetables you can plant shallots.

Clean and sharpen garden tools. Cutting tools can be sharpened at the "Repair Shop" at Dinedor.

*Put up nesting boxes.

*Continue to feed birds and provide access to fresh water. Complete hedge maintenance during this month as some birds can start nesting in early March.

New Community Resource in Wormelow

internet is a fickle thing at the top of Barrack Hill and sometimes I resort to coffee at Simply Stunning in Wormelow in order to get online. A couple of weeks ago, up against a deadline I headed down there looking forward to a latte while I availed myself of their internet. I pushed open the door and to my amazement there was not a single expensive dining table or sofa in sight. Most of the furniture had gone—replaced by a lot of shelving, full of exciting and colourful craft materials.

"We'll be opening next week" one of the enthusiastic women working there told me, "providing craft materials for local schools and people." I cast my eye over the vast shop floor and imagined the fun that a class or two of children would have rifling through these goodies. They have already been in touch with Much Birch School and Nursery.

The project is run by Herefordshire Community Environment Group, founded by Andrew Wood who said he needed something to keep him occupied when he retired and so he began litter picking which led to working with forty to fifty volunteers and raising £4000 from recycling crisp packets! He then opened the Scrap Store in Rotherwas, but that had to close when the Council ruled that it was not 'light industrial use' for which these units were intended. But the old Simply Stunning building is a great place for this enterprise and the café is now open again, thanks to volunteers. 'We couldn't have hoped for a better welcome from residents,' Andrew told me. Everyone there is happy to be 'doing their bit for the environment and for Herefordshire.'

At this time of year, we start to notice that the days are getting longer. It comes as a great comfort, not that we had any doubt, but the simple rhythm of the year after the long dark nights of January (and we didn't even have Christmas to cheer us up) gives us a sense of the permanency of the world.

We need this as well because, however you get your news, the world seems a very difficult place right now. Not that it hasn't been in the past, but the old certainties of the nationstate and of iron curtains and East v's West have been taken away and we are not sure what is replacing them, other than uncertainty, terrorism and fear.

When people thought that history would end with the fall of the Soviet Union and that having a McDonald's in every country meant that nations wouldn't go to war, it was easy to be hopeful for a peaceful world. Now – not so much. What was papered over by materialism and consumerism has reared its ugly head, be it ultra-nationalism, fanaticism or conspiracy theory.

How do we find light and hope in such times? I am reminded of the Easter Vigil – a service that takes place just after Sunset on Holy (Easter) Saturday. All seems lost, all is dark. Yet a single candle is lit outside a church and brought in. A pale, flickering light that bounces off the pews and walls of the church. That small light pushes back the darkness and hope is reborn.

Eric and Doe's Travels—Wadebridge Sunday 9th October 2022

This one is down to Doe, who was reading the camping book in the library! and found an article on the Camel trail, an18 mile cycle trail along an old railway line. Wadebridge is almost the middle point of the trail. We found a campsite at Little Bodrieve, about a mile out, booked it, and here we are, 195 miles and 4.5 hours later—great weather, a bit overcast and blowing.

A big site with statics and lots of tourers on a permanent basis. It looks as if we are the only ones here except that there are people in one static. The place is crawling with rabbits and mushrooms. That's right, mushrooms, which we had for tea tonight.

We walked into Wadebridge, about a mile away, crossed the Cam river. The tide was out but later we watched it running in fast. We are here mainly to cycle the Camel trail, but the town is very nice and clean and we must have a closer look as most was shut today because it's Sunday. We are here for three nights. If we get bored there is a bus stop just outside the camp and we have bus passes. " have pass will travel" It's seven o'clock, it's dark and we're so glad that there are very few lights about, just natural light.

Monday 10th

It rained a bit in the night, but fine, almost clear sky this morning. The plan is to cycle to Bodmin which is about 8.5 miles each way.

So, it's back down the hill, across the river Cam and on to the Camel Trail. The tide is fast receding as we head up the river to Bodmin. It's an old railway line that has been converted to this great trail.

Within yards of leaving the town there is a big bend, all muddy and messy. In the shallows there are a number of big fish that must be 18 inches long twisting and turning showing their white bellies, I wonder will they get any further up this muddy river. A little further on there is a big Heron hoping to catch his breakfast.

A little further on we find a bird hide, from where we look out onto a big area of draining sea, there are lots of birds there, Curlew, Godwit, Redshank, lots of Canada geese to name but a few.

We push on, sometimes alongside the river Cam or through avenues of various natural trees. The trail has been tarred and is very easy to cycle along.

It's quite busy with dog walkers, mothers pushing prams, runners and bikers on electric bikes, normal bikes and some with big thick wheels, all of us enjoying a lovely day in the sun and shade.

On this trail we are one with nature, a few old station platforms, a vineyard and a cafe.

This river is a haven for Otters, we saw none, but after about a mile up the water in the river was crystal clear. **To be continued in March**
