BROADBAND UPGRADE VOUCHER SCHEME

Many of our community have struggled, we are sure, with our slow broadband connections at times. We now have the chance to upgrade our entire system by installing fibre broadband to every property.

The previous 'Fastershire' scheme only took fibre to the exchanges and then carried it onto properties on the old copper wires. Those near to the exchanges were lucky, but a large proportion of us saw very little or no change to our speed at all.

Openreach are now, with government support, able to roll out full fibre broadband to everyone in our community – truly a godsend to those whose speeds hover around 30 gigabytes or in many cases a lot less, for some only single figures. There are huge benefits to every property and every user in our exchange – reliability and speed being the crucial ones. This really is a genuine opportunity for every home.

All you will agree to do when you pledge your voucher worth £4500 to Open Reach, is to sign up to a full fibre service from a provider of your choice once the network is built. There are well over 20, including EE, BT, Talk Talk, Giganet, Co-op, Fastnet, Fibrenet, Zen, Sky B/B and Vodaphone, there is every likelihood you are already with one of these. The current best deals for 150mb are around £30.

Don't forget this is the chance for the whole community to enjoy speeds that will allow all to run a business from home, let the children do their homework, stream a film and manage your household health and financial services – all at the same time!! This is 'future proofing your home' for years to come.

Please help all those in our community, your friends and neighbours, to enjoy this free upgrade to an internet fibre connection we need going forward that everyone should be able to experience in 2024!

Much Birch Community Speedwatch Scheme

One of the recurring issues reported to Much Birch Parish Council was drivers travelling too fast on our rural roads and also the A49 so it was decided to see if we could get a Community Speedwatch (CSW) scheme set up. It took a while but it finally went operational in March. Whilst the scheme is supported and facilitated by the Parish Council they have nothing to do with the operational side which is overseen by Terry Cook, our co-ordinator.

All the sites used have been checked and risk assessed by West Mercia Police, all volunteers have been trained and monitoring has started with several vehicles already being reported for excess speed. There will be no advance warning of the dates and sites being monitored, for obvious reasons, but monitoring can take place at any time during daylight hours and will reflect the locations where complaints have been received.

Weather

We Brits love to talk about the weather. It has always been, so it seems, a subject of conversation whether in the pub or around the dining room table. It harks back to our roots in farming – when were dependent upon the land more directly than most of us are now, and in great works of literature from Shakespeare (The Witches in McBeth) to Jane Austin (from her letters, “What dreadful hot weather we have! It keeps me in a continual state of inelegance”) – which is not surprising given the amount of clothes she had to wear.

But our weather hasn't been behaving itself – yes we have frost in winter but not as many days as the records show in previous years, and we have heat in summer – but the last two years we have had temperatures in the mid-30s to low 40s °C. Not what we expect.

These signs are signs that our earth is changing, and changing faster than birds, plants and animals can keep

up with. Species that like cooler weather are moving north or to higher altitudes, and genera that we might see only rarely, such as the Glossy Ibis have started to breed in the UK.

What can we do? Well, in this election year (possibly) we can hold those who are in power to account. Human-induced climate change is recognised by all sorts of groups as affecting our climate and we need to do something about it. The chemistry and physics of this are well known but what is lacking is the leadership to slow the changes down and to help us to change our lifestyles so that we don't contribute more than we have to.

These are not easy choices but ones that we have to make for the generations to come, if they are to enjoy the beauty of nature and the abundance of wildlife we have around us. In giving us dominion over the earth, God wanted humankind to help creation flourish, what we are doing at the moment is the exact opposite!

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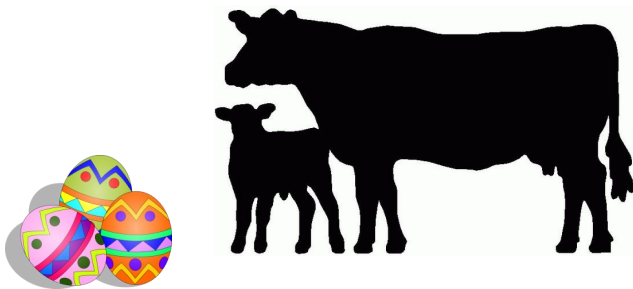

This was followed by a few sunny days with a drying wind. Our plants and seedlings spent some time in the cold frame and I was able to reduce the height of some of our grass.

We have a small peach tree in a tub and many flower buds were starting to open by the end of February, when frosts were forecast. The peach was put in the greenhouse and in several days many of the flowers

*Keep listening/watching the weather forecast so that tender plants can be protected if a frost is imminent.

*If you have forced some rhubarb, harvest stems at 20-30 cms long. Afterwards mulch around the crowns with manure or compost and do not harvest until 2025 because forcing weakens the plant.

I've lived in various areas of the South West over the past 70 years and have come across many sayings, discovering that they differ from region to region. We use many in conversation, mostly without a second thought. I heard several on the TV, including 'It landed as softly as a butterfly with sore feet', used during commentary on a golf match, a dark cloud was described as 'It's black over Bill's mother's'.

I ended up writing to all the local newspapers in England, asking them to print a letter in which I asked people to send in their family sayings – I was inundated!

I compiled a book of all I received, putting them under headings such as Advice, Confusion, Marriage, and many others. Most referred to body parts and were quite base, but still regularly used. Some came from certain parts of the country, identified by place names, but since the introduction of motor cars people have moved around and sayings have moved with them. My father, a Cornish man, would respond to my constant, 'Where?' questions with 'Up in Nellie's room, behind the clock'.

In Herefordshire I was told they said 'In the oven behind the bread/cake' or the ruder version of 'Up Jack's ar*e on a piece of string'. Others were 'Where the ducks fly backwards to keep the dust out of their eyes', 'she's gone to see a man about a dog'. They still make me laugh and I still hear new ones regularly. Their origins are often unknown, sometimes just used in one family, or from Shakespeare, all interesting or amusing. I love them.

At the Much Birch Parish Council Meeting held in Much Birch Community Hall on 7th March the Parish Council discussed the parish land again and heard about a possible proposal for the future use of the part of the land near to "Valley View". This would be explored further. A local planning application had received a committee referral. This was for planning consultation application number 240148 and was for the Pilgrim Hotel, Much Birch. The parish council resolved that they would not register to speak at the planning meeting and they had previously resolved to support the proposals in application 240148.
